

Aga Khan Award for Architecture 2019

Project submissions for 2017-2019

### How to submit a project

The Aga Khan Award for Architecture is given every three years to projects that set new standards of excellence in architecture, planning practices, historic preservation and landscape architecture. The Award carries with it a triennial prize fund of \$1,000,000. The thirteenth cycle of the Award, which runs from 2017 until autumn 2019, is now open for nominations.

SUBMISSION PERIOD: 15 March 2017 to 30 October 2018.

**WHO CAN SUBMIT**: Projects can be submitted by anyone, including the architects.

CRITERIA: The Award seeks projects that represent the broadest possible range of architectural interventions. All types of building projects that affect today's environment may be submitted. Projects can range from modest, small-scale buildings to sizeable complexes, from single homes, bus stops and rural school buildings to skyscrapers, infrastructure and transportation undertakings, housing initiatives, educational and health campuses, new towns, urban conservation projects and the re-use of brownfield sites. Particular attention is given to building schemes that use local resources and appropriate technology in innovative ways, and to projects likely to inspire similar efforts elsewhere. The central criterion, however, is excellence.

**PROJECT DATES:** Projects are required to have been completed between 1 January 2012 and 31 December 2017 and been in use for at least one full year. **PROJECT LOCATIONS:** Projects can be located anywhere in the world but must successfully address the needs and aspirations of societies in which Muslims have a significant presence.

MASTER JURY: Once projects are nominated, they are presented to a Master Jury, which is reconstituted during each new cycle. The Master Jury reviews the nominations and selects a shortlist of projects. In a rigorous process unmatched by other architectural prizes, on-site reviewers are sent to each site to examine the short-listed projects. The Master Jury then reviews the reports of the on-site reviewers and makes a final selection of Award recipients.

**SHORTLIST:** The shortlist will be announced in spring 2019.

**CEREMONY:** The Award ceremony will be held in autumn 2019.
